United Way celebrates 17 years of Making a Difference

How would you describe this year's Make a Difference Day?

"Awesome," "difference-mak-these are just a few ways to define this year's United Way Make a Difference Day in Northwest Georgia. On Oct. 21 and 22, 638 volunteers invested 2,448 hours of service to the community on 16 projects. That's worth \$58,262.40 to the community based on The Independent Sector value of a volunteer's time!

Thank you to sponsors Brown Industries and Phenix Flooring for making great things possible. Not only did Brown Industries and Phenix Flooring make a financial investment so that project supplies such as paint, mulch and building materials were available, but they also made a physical investment by rolling up their sleeves and getting to work to help with many of the projects. In all, 30 volunteers from Brown and Phenix participated.

Lynn Whitworth, co-owner of Brown Industries and United Way board member, said "Brown Industries is thrilled to be able to support this for our community. It's a great way to do team building and to give back to our community at the same time." Brown participated in three of the Make a Difference Day projects Boys and Girls Club, Dalton-Whitfield Library and United Way of Northwest Georgia.

Robbie Slocumb, CEO of the Boys and Girls Clubs serving Chattooga, Gordon, Murray & Whitfield Counties, had this to say about Make a Difference Day: "United Way of Northwest Georgia did it again! We are so very thankful for their willingness to support our organization at every level. Phenix Flooring focused their attention on the Meals on Wheels building project in Murray County. The team repainted the

a much-needed logo, designed by Brown Industries, so residents could easily identify the Meal on Wheels location.

Curious as to what types of Make a Difference Day projects took place this year?

Carter Hope Center: Volunteers installed steps in-between the parking lot and the women's housing.

■ Pleasant Grove Elementary School: Dalton State College's social work majors gave a special education classroom a makeover by brightening up the walls, creating sensory tubs, making a cozier reading nook and by installing raised bed gardens for classroom learning.

■ Roan School: Volunteers assembled raised bed gardens for classrooms to use.

■ Women's Enrichment Center: Volunteers painted two classrooms and put sealant on a brick wall to keep it from deteriorating.

■ United Way of Northwest Georgia: Volunteers painted the bathrooms, replaced carpet tile and spruced up the grounds of United Way of Northwest Georgia.

■ North Georgia Healthcare Partnership: Volunteers sanded and painted four old newspaper boxes to transform them into book boxes. These boxes will be placed in the community for people to put books in or take a book to enjoy.

■ Northwest Georgia Family Crisis Center: Volunteers assisted in decorating and hosting a fall festival for the former and current clients on the

■ Dalton-Whitfield County Library: Volunteers decorated bags and stuffed them with a blanket, a stuffed animal and several books. These bedtime bags will be given to children at the Whitfield County-Dalton Day Care Center.

• Murray County Meals on Wheels: Volunteers painted the entire building and applied two logos onto the building so that it can now be identified. Prior to this, there were no signs to indicate that the building is a Meals on Wheels location.

■ Blue Ridge Elementary School: Volunteers built a see-through planter for the school garden. This will allow the students to observe the growth of a living plant under the soil.

■ Boys and Girls Club: Dalton and Chatsworth Clubs: Volunteers completed an expansion of the mountain bike park at the Carl Rollins Unit and completed site prep at the Chatsworth unit to prepare for adding recreation areas.

New Hope Middle School: Volunteers planted butterfly bushes, put up bird houses and spread mulch.

Northwest Georgia SORBA: Volunteers cleaned up the entrance to the Raisin Trails Park. They also built a bike rack and added on to the existing bike trails.

■ Young Leader's Society: Volunteers repainted the USA maps at Cohutta Elementary and City Park Schools. They also created two new maps at Woodlawn Elementary and Eastside Elementary Schools.

School: Volunteers created books in French that will be published and put into elementary schools to encourage younger students to learn a new language.

■ Conasauga River Watershed Clean-Up: Volunteers removed more than 5 tons of trash from seven different sites in Whitfield and Murray counties.

I enjoyed touring some of the sites to see the impact that will be sustainable for years to come.
