United Way also provides grants and volunteer mobilization to help with home repairs, accessibility for those with disability and weatherization for the elderly, low-income and the disabled, as well as assistance with housing costs and utility assistance.

United Way's Safe Homes impact in 2015:

■ 165 people received shelter in family transitional housing units.

442 people received overnight shelter, totaling 28,518 bed nights (6,595 were for domestic violence).

■ 2,574 people received hous-

ing assistance - housing counseling, rent/mortgage assistance, temporary shelter, subsidized housing, etc.

■ 10,095 individuals received assistance to reduce their longterm need for food, housing or utility assistance through counseling, life skills or financial counseling.

■ 22,600 individuals' shortterm needs were met because they received food, clothing, furniture, prescription medication and/or direct financial (rent or utility) assistance.

■ 11 individuals received job training or education designed to move them from low-wage jobs to higher income jobs.

641 domestic violence calls were answered.

■ 15 projects took place benefiting approximately 310 people with repairs of roofs, walls, water heaters and floors so that people could stay in their home.

■ 181 people benefited from disaster services (single-family home fires, natural disasters, multifamily home fires and/or flooding incidents).

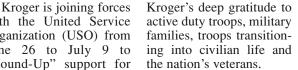


'Round up' your bill at Kroger to help support the USO

With the goal of raising \$250,000, "Round-Up" funds will quickly add up to make a world of difference in the lives of military heroes.

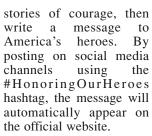
Kroger has also partnered with the USO through "Honoring Our Heroes," a multifaceted program designed to show
