Low-income students are at **increased risk for not graduating high school or attending college.**



Chronic food insecurity leads to less healthy eating and increased stress, both of which contribute to poor health.



Difficulty in achieving and maintaining good health. When health issues go untreated, they become more serious and more costly, and lead to other poor outcomes.



Many families struggle to obtain **quality child care** which is critical to a child's development and to a family's income stability and growth.



Struggle to **save for emergencies or future financial goals** which make them vulnerable to unexpected emergencies and ongoing financial hardships.

Too many of our neighbors, coworkers, and families are ALICE families: Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed. These are hard-working individuals doing all the right things, yet they still struggle to afford basic necessities like food, housing, utilities, and healthcare.

ALICE families are forced to make tough choices, such as deciding between quality child care or paying the rent. These choices have long-term consequences not only for their families but for all.



The ALICE Household Survival Budget varies based on household size and composition.

In Whitfield County:

+ 17% live below the federal poverty level
+ 25% are ALICE Households
+ 42% of households struggle to afford basic necessities

In Murray County:

+ 13% live below the federal poverty level
+ 28% are ALICE Households
+ 41% of households struggle to afford basic necessities
