

# UNITED WAY VOLUNTEER CENTER 2019

United Way mobilized 2,224 volunteers who gave 18,872 hours of service in 2019. This represents an impact of \$465,949 to our community.

United Way Volunteer Center organized 128 hands-on volunteer projects in 2019.

United Way YOUTH UNITED mobilized 160 middle school, high school, and college students who volunteered 692 hours through Volunteer Vacation, goLEAD, Co-Op Days of Service, and service learning days.

LEADERS UNITED, our board service training program, trained 22 volunteers this year and has provided nearly 365 trained board members to area non-profits since the program's inception.

Make A Difference Day, sponsored by Brown Industries and Phenix Flooring, mobilized 442 volunteers who gave 1,442 hours of service.





# TOGETHER WE IMPACTED 57,640 CHILDREN, YOUTH, ADULTS, & ELDERLY

August 9, 2019 marked 2 years since Keiri Suárez was in a life-altering car accident. The accident left her paralyzed from the neck down and her only movement is through facial expressions. Keiri has a ventilator attached to her wheelchair so she can breathe. Because of the sensitivity of the equipment, it cannot get wet. Through United Way's Community Solutions program, we were able to reach out to our Community Partner, Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dalton, and set up a volunteer project to build the Suárez family a carport so that Keiri could get to her doctor's appointments. "This seemingly small addition will give Keiri more freedom and a better quality of life," stated Keiri's mother, Sandra. Even though the accident definitely changed Keiri's aspirations, she never lost her will to complete goals like getting her GED and finishing high school. Keiri has also created new goals for herself. Someday she wants to be in schools advocating for safer driving and letting people know they aren't the only ones on the road.
