Organization announces yearly volunteer awards

Honoring "everyday people who are doing extraordinary things" was the goal Tuesday of an event hosted by the United Way of Northwest Georgia, said Amanda Burt, president of the organization.

The group held its "Year in Review: Annual Meeting and Volunteer Awards" banquet at Stage 123 in downtown Dalton to celebrate individuals and partner corporations who in 2014 dedicated their time, effort and money to support area charities that improve lives throughout the community.

"All of the people recognized tonight do their part, come together and support the individuals around them," Burt said. "These people are truly making a difference in their community."

Among the honorees were two women who work full-time jobs in Murray and Whitfield county, respectively, but spent a combined



338 hours last year volunteering to aid both children and adults locally.
