# **Young Leaders Society**



The Young Leaders Society engages the next generation of philanthropists and volunteers ages 20 - 40 by creating a brighter future for our community, while serving as a driving force in retention of young professionals for local employers. In 2016, 266 members made a household gift of \$365+ annually, investing a total of \$190,885.

# **Women's Leadership Council**



The Women's Leadership Council is a group of women truly generous in heart and spirit who bring vision, energy, talent, and creativity to create lasting change. Members of the Women's Leadership Council give \$1,000 or more annually. In 2016, 317 Women's Leadership Council members invested \$1.12 million.

## **Leadership Giving**

Leadership givers join hundreds of like-minded individuals in our community who come together to make Great Things Happen. Leadership giving has been a large focus of corporate campaigns with 712 donors making a household investment of \$1,000 or more annually to United Way, representing \$1.5 million in 2016.

# **Alexis De Tocqueville Society**



The Alexis de Tocqueville Society, chartered by Julian Saul in Northwest Georgia in 1996 with 23 members, was created to deepen individual support for United Way's work in education, basic needs, and health in our community. Today, the Alexis De Tocqueville Society boasts 72 members who invest \$898,771 in United Way.

## **Peacock Legacy Society**



Launched in 2015, the Peacock Legacy Society allows Alexis de Tocqueville members to endow their annual gift in perpetuity and corporations to deepen their support beyond the annual campaign. The Peacock Legacy Society has pledges and planned gift provisions from three corporations and five families totaling almost \$5 million.

#### **UNITED WAY VOLUNTEER CENTER 2016**

In total, United Way mobilized 3,287 volunteers who gave 33,511 hours of service in 2016. This represents an impact of \$787,508 to our community.

United Way Volunteer Center organized 152 hands-on volunteer projects in 2016.

The United Way Youth Corps mobilized 394 middle school, high school, and college students who volunteered through Volunteer Vacation, goLEAD (high school), LEAP (college), and service learning days, giving 1,507 hours of service.

BOARDWALK, our board service training program, trained 28 volunteers this year and has provided 350 trained board members to area non-profits since the program's inception.

Make a Difference Day, sponsored by Brown Industries and Phenix Flooring, mobilized 638 volunteers this year, who gave 2,448 hours of service.





## **Daniel's Story**

"My story starts in a jail cell – at rock bottom. But thanks to United Way, my life was changed at Carter Hope Center, a residential recovery shelter. My addiction was full blown by the age of 17. I spent my twenties chasing the next high and destroying every relationship in my life. When I arrived at Carter Hope, I learned the science behind my addiction, and it gave me a better understanding of the inner workings of my brain chemistry. I was surrounded by people who encouraged me every step of the way. Since completing the program six years ago, I am in a wonderful marriage. I get to be the father that I never had. I earned a bachelor's degree and am a minister at Rock Bridge Community Church. I'm privileged to give back to my community."



## **Carletta's Story**

"In 2004, my son Sean entered the doors of Friendship House, a United Way Community Partner. I am grateful that he received high quality childcare and that he entered kindergarten ready to succeed. Fortunately, the highly qualified staff recognized that my son had a speech impairment and connected him to services needed to correct it. Today, Sean is 14 years old and gives back by volunteering every summer at Friendship House"
