Hospitals the focus of | Women's Leadership next Roundtable talk

The April meeting of the Dalton Civil War Roundtable will be Thursday at the Hamilton House at 701 Chattanooga Avenue. The program will begin at 7 p.m.

The program will be presented by Patsy Harris from Madison and is titled "The Confederate Hospitals of Madison,

Harris was born on the North Carolina coast and lived in Florida, where she was a registered nurse and earned a degree in anthropology, before moving to Madison in 1994. In Madison she began working with local archivists on archeological projects and developed a tremendous love and respect for the deep history of Morgan

Since 2000 she has published five books centered on Morgan County's records to make its rich history accessible to historians, genealogists and to individuals trying to uncover greater details about their

Her latest book — "The Confederate Hospitals of Madison, Georgia-Their Records-Their Histories-1861-1865" brings to life a previously unknown era in Madison, its hosting of four official Confederate hospitals, their surgeons and staff, and thousands of patients during the War Between the States.

In the first chapter of this book she writes, "The author states the surgeons and doctors of the Confederate Hospital Corps not only provided a high level of care and compassion for their patients but they also created and maintained extensive records of their actions, their medical decisions, and their daily activity related to individual patient care."

It is from these extensive records that

Harris, through many years of study and research, was able to compile a book detailing and explaining the stories and the lives of the patients and doctors as they endured many trials, heartaches, acquired diseases and adversity related to the massive and unrelenting warfare.

Also from the first chapter, "... in December 1863, Georgia Railroad cars had arrived in Madison with the property, attendants and medical officers of three fully organized, but nomadic, Confederate hospitals. The surgeons attached to the hospitals were veterans of a new normal, expert at quickly discharging all patients and then transporting elsewhere entire medical units to keep pace with the Confederate Army's advance and retreat. Within their first two weeks in Madison, all three hospitals were in operation as they and dozens of other similar hospitals within the authority of the Army of Tennessee received sick and wounded soldiers from the bloody front."

The author explained that she "was able to follow and in a way began to know individual soldiers as they arrived in Madison ... with some surviving ... some being moved to other hospitals ... some, very few, being returned to service ... and some with mental or physical conditions that were beyond repair."

The author also said "these soldiers became her soldiers. She felt a very strong attachment for the soldiers and their families, even though the records and the documents she was reviewing and exploring and writing about related to events that occurred one hundred and fifty years ago."

The public is invited to attend as all Dalton Civil War Roundtable meetings are free and open to the public. Light refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the program.

Rabies vaccinations May 2

The Whitfield County reduced fee rabies vaccination clinic is Saturday, May 2, with fees of \$10 per cat or dog vaccinated.

"We have been doing this reduced rabies vaccination clinic since the '70s to help the public protect themselves and their pets against rabies," veterinarian Chris Stearns said. "We have kept the low price of \$10 per cat or dog vaccinated to encourage everyone to have their pets vaccinated. The rabies shots at the clinics are valid throughout the United States, so pet owners in northwest Georgia and Tennessee are welcome to bring their animals if they wish."

"We want to urge people to bring their cats in also. At our clinic we have had a rabid kitten, and in neighboring counties cats infected with rabies are on the rise. Cats are at great risk of contracting rabies because of their hunting instincts and chances of coming into contact with a rabid animal," Stearns continued. "It is important that both cats and dogs be vaccinated against rabies."

Dogs must be leashed and cats in a pet carrier. Distemper, parvo and other vaccines are available also. Prices vary for these vaccines.

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While rabies is rare in the United States because of strict vaccination laws, worldwide there are about 55,000 cases annually, with a death rate of almost 100 per-

Participating in the rabies clinic are Dalton Animal Care, Animal Hospital of Whitfield County and Higdon Animal Hospital.

"We are glad to provide this service to the communi-

ty," Stearns said. "With rabies in Whitfield County and in nearby counties, we are at great risk for a rabies outbreak. For just \$10 you can protect your family and your pet from rabies. We urge everyone who has a cat or dog to have them vaccinated at one of the clinics May 2."

Dogs must be on a leash and cats in a pet carrier.
